(Michael Bonaventure gave the world premieres of Anderson's *Each Night that dies with dawn ...* which he commissioned in 1985, and her *The Lone Piper*, and *Repetitive Strain*)

(Michael Bonaventure is the leading interpreter and champion of the organ works of James Douglas and has premiered many of this composer's organ compositions.)

4. Edward McGuire (b.1948), composer and director of the Scottish folk-band *The Whistlebinkies*

(Michael Bonaventure gave the world premiere of McGuire's *Prelude IV. Prelude IV* was dedicated to the composer Frederick Rimmer, who was Professor of Music at the University of Glasgow. Michael Bonaventure was a student of Rimmer's while he was Organ Scholar in the University of Glasgow. McGuire's *A Kist O' Whistles* for folk-band and organ was premiered by Michael Bonaventure at St Mary's, Haddington on 11 December 1999)

9. Jean-Pierre Leguay (b 1939), composer and organiste titulaire des Grandes-Orgues, Cathédrale Notre-Dame, Paris

(Michael Bonventure gave the world premiere of Leguay's *Horizon* and is, outside France, the leading interpreter of the organ works of this composer. *Horizon* (*Sonate No 3*) was written for Michael Bonaventure by Jean-Pierre Leguay in response to a commission from Edinburgh Contemporary Arts Trust (ECAT) and the Institut Français d'Ecosse in 1994/95 with the financial assistance of an Scottish Arts Council grant and a French Government Grant. *Horizon* was given its world premiere on 19 April 1996 by Michael Bonaventure in St Giles Edinburgh who gave also its first performance in France in St Roch, Paris in 1996.)

15 letters and 1 card from Leguay to Bonaventure: This correspondence mentions Leguay's own compositions, including *Capriccio*, *XIX Préludes*, *Etoile*, *Aube*, *Azur*, *Madrigal VIII* and *Horizon (Sonate No 3)*. *Horizon* was premiered by Michael Bonaventure in Edinburgh in 1996. The correspondence also mentions Leguay's recordings of Brahms, Liszt, Vierne and Gigout; the restoration of the Notre Dame instrument; Leguay's opinions on Michael Bonaventure's compositions, particularly *Animus VI* and Leguay's views on contemporary music in general.
